# Preparation for entry to university

---

Students commencing study at University come from a diverse range of learning backgrounds.

The University's admission policies and procedures have been designed:

- to ensure that opportunities are provided to prospective students from a wide range of backgrounds and learning experiences to access, participate and succeed in University study;
- to ensure that students who are admitted have reasonable prospects of successfully undertaking and completing higher education study, noting that in some cases additional preparation, access to transition support and relevant resources before and early in the course will be needed; and
- to encourage breadth and depth in learning to senior secondary school students and the undertaking of intellectually challenging syllabuses in preparation for University study.

To succeed in higher education studies students will need to have:

- given thought to the nature and demands (academic and personal) of higher education study including the importance of self-motivation, independent and 'deep' learning (learning how to learn), organisation and time management skills;
- the capacity to develop higher-level communication, analytical, problem solving and information literacy skills;
- a commitment to establishing personal and vocational goals for university study; and
- recognised that the nature of the demands of various disciplines will differ, that academic interests and possibilities will change for many students during their time at university, and that opportunities to change courses and majors are possible and often positive.

The University of Tasmania has a number of preparatory programs designed to help students prepare for tertiary study. For more information about these programs, information and transition support services for first year students, and scholarships available to provide some financial support, see pages 27 for contact details.

## English Language Proficiency

English is the language of tuition and learning at the University of Tasmania and adequate communication skills (written and oral) are critical factors for success in any University course. All students are expected to have or to develop an adequate proficiency in English. Any concerns about English communication skills (for example, if you do not have an English speaking background) should be indicated on your application and, where appropriate, support and other transition services may be identified when an offer of a place is made. ## Selection procedures

---

To be considered for admission to a course you must

- address the general University entry requirements; and
- satisfy any course prerequisites and specific entry requirements.

Please note that meeting the University's admission requirements does not guarantee you entry to the course of your choice. Some courses have limited places available. You will be selected in competition with other eligible applicants. Refer to the 2010 Course and Unit website (available in early September 2009) <http://www.utas.edu.au/courses> for prerequisites and special entry requirements. If you cannot satisfy prerequisites or special requirements, and consider you have a case for selection on other grounds, you should include an explanatory note with your 2010 Application for Admission.

In cases where applicants do not receive an offer in the course(s) of their choice, the University will contact you to discuss other course options.

# Admission requirements

---

## General Entry Requirements

Admission to many courses is available on the basis of a wide variety of backgrounds and experiences. You may apply for admission to the University on the basis of meeting one or more of the following General Entry Requirements.

- Senior Secondary – one of: TCE (SA in at least four pre-tertiary subjects); Year 11/12 ITI/TER score; Interstate TER; International Baccalaureate Diploma, ACE, concessional entry; OR
- Completion of one of the following: TAFE/VET qualifications: Certificate III or IV or equivalent; Diploma; Advanced Diploma; TAFE articulation program; OR
- Prior university study, either completed or partially completed; OR
- Successful completion of all units in a university enabling program; OR
- Results from a relevant aptitude test (may include ACER admission tests, STAT); OR
- Provision of a supporting statement outlining evidence of capacity to succeed (see How to complete your application for further details)

Some courses have additional entry requirements. For specific entry criteria, check the course information at the online Course and Unit Handbook at <http://www.utas.edu.au/courses>.

Applicants who have met general entry requirements but who do not satisfy course specific entry requirements will be contacted by our staff to discuss other course options.

## Senior Secondary

If you have already completed or are completing your senior secondary schooling (Year 12/13) in 2009, you can apply for entry on the basis of your senior secondary school qualifications.

For most courses you will be assessed solely on your Year 12 results. Special entry conditions apply for some courses, for example some of those in Visual and Performing Arts. Applicants will be contacted if they are required to attend interviews or auditions for their course preferences.

## Tasmanian senior secondary applicants

The minimum entry requirements are listed below:

- at least two years in post year 10 study for the Tasmanian Certificate of Education (TCE) (or another approved senior secondary program) requiring enrolment in a combination of subjects designed for Years 11 and 12; and
- a Satisfactory Achievement (SA) result or better in a minimum of four Senior Secondary pre-tertiary subjects, chosen from the schedule of subjects approved by the University (see page 11; and
- attainment of the minimum of four subjects in not more than two (not necessarily consecutive) sittings. The Tertiary Entrance Rank (TER) will be calculated from the Tertiary Entrance scores obtained in the two sittings which satisfy the minimum entry requirements.

Selection of Tasmanian senior secondary applicants for most courses will be based on the Tertiary Entrance Rank (TER). The TE score is calculated by aggregating the scores of your best three Senior Secondary pre-tertiary subjects (from Year 12 or 13), together with the best score(s) of up to two other pre-tertiary subjects in that year or one other year. This score is then expressed as a percentile TER.

If you do not meet any of these requirements, it is still possible to gain entry to the University. Applicants who do not meet the above requirements will be considered for their course preferences on a concessional basis, or will be contacted to discuss course options. To be considered for concessional entry an applicant's performance in the TCE and any supporting evidence of their capacity to undertake higher education study will be assessed. Supporting evidence may take the form of advice from the relevant School/College/Principal or Careers Advisor.

Offers made in these circumstances will identify any conditions you may need to meet, including undertaking foundation study and/or academic performance in your initial studies, to allow you to transfer at a later point to your preferred course of study. More information on alternative entry pathways is provided on page 14.

If you wish to apply for an exemption from the 'two years in post year 10 study' component of the minimum entry requirements, you should submit a written application and forward it to the Admissions Office.

Applications based on Year 11/12 results will also be considered in the following circumstances:

- if you completed Year 11 in a state other than Tasmania. The application must include certified evidence of completion of Year 11. If you are considering an overseas exchange it is advisable to do so in Year 11 and, if appropriate, to apply for status at your Year 11 school in one subject and then to complete Year 12 and/or Year 13, in Tasmania. You

would normally be expected to complete the minimum entry requirements in Year 12; or

- if you recommenced TCE studies after a break of one year or more due to employment or other circumstances. These circumstances may include such things as family responsibilities, overseas study or educational disadvantage. Your application must include documentary evidence of employment or other circumstances. You would normally be expected to complete the minimum entry requirements in Year 12; or
- if you are engaged in full-time or part-time employment or training while enrolled in TCE studies. Your application must include evidence of employment.

The University has approved arrangements for recognising senior secondary results (TCE and VET) for students who do not qualify for a Tertiary Entrance Rank through completing the required minimum four TCE pre-tertiary subjects for university entry. Applicants are allocated a notional TE score based on their studies and may gain entry to a number of Associate Degree programs offered by the University.

### **Interstate senior secondary applicants**

If you completed your senior secondary education interstate you will be considered eligible for selection if you have met the necessary admission requirements or course prerequisites and have qualified for admission to a higher education institution in your home state. You will be ranked with other applicants on the basis of your Year 12 Tertiary Entrance Rank (ENTER, ATAR, OP or equivalent).

### **International Baccalaureate Diploma**

If you completed the full diploma you qualify for admission to the University of Tasmania. ### **Overseas qualifications**

Subjects passed overseas may be counted towards minimum entry requirements. You should produce original copies of results for subjects passed elsewhere, together with a certified translation (NAATI accredited translator or Department of Immigration and Citizenship – includes Translation and Interpreter Service), if appropriate. Detailed subject descriptions and method of assessment details are also required to assist in determining equivalence to Tasmanian subjects.

### **Other senior secondary studies**

Applicants with other senior secondary studies should provide original copies of results and curriculum information with their application.

## TAFE /VET

Applicants who have completed or partially completed a Certificate III, Certificate IV, Diploma or Advanced Diploma course at a TAFE college or other VET provider will be considered for entry. In a number of cases you may be eligible for credit. The University recognises successful TAFE/VET studies as an important entry pathway to higher education study.

## University Study

This includes applicants who have completed or are currently completing, or have previously been enrolled in a degree or diploma course at the University of Tasmania or another higher education institution. It includes current University of Tasmania students wishing to transfer to another course and those applying for re-admission following exclusion from a tertiary institution.

## University Enabling Program

Successful completion of all units in a university enabling program qualifies as meeting general entry requirements.

The University Preparation Program (UPP) is a pre-university program aimed at assisting potential students in their preparation for University study. The program has a number of delivery modes on each campus: face-to-face delivery, online and HELP sessions. Students can select from one to four units, depending on their needs. Students may enrol in one unit in order to address a specific skill need or may complete a semester or full year of UPP. Some of the units offered are Study Skills, Written Communications, Information Literacy, Bridging Maths, Preliminary Academic Activities and Using Technology.

## Aptitude Test

If you are applying for admission based on completion of an aptitude test, you should provide formal results notification including the type of test, results, year, location of sitting, and whether the test was invigilated under supervision.

## STAT Test

The University of Tasmania rarely requires an applicant to sit this test to gain entry. If you are in doubt please contact the Admissions Office on 1300 361 928 or by email [Admissions@utas.edu.au](mailto:Admissions@utas.edu.au) before arranging to sit a test.

The STAT, written and assessed by the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) (<http://www.acer.edu.au/stat/index.html>), is administered for Tasmanian residents by the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC). Testing sessions are usually held in Hobart during October and December each year. Other organisations which conduct STAT tests are listed on the ACER website.

Full details of STAT including dates, venues for testing sessions and registration fees, together with a copy of the VTAC application form which incorporates STAT registration, are in the VTAC Guide 2010. This is available from all major newsagents for \$12.95 (inc.GST) or can be accessed on the VTAC website free of charge. ## Supporting Statement

Applicants who are required to complete a supporting statement in order to meet general entry requirements are advised to relate the statement to the course(s) for which you are seeking entry. This statement may be completed as part of the 2010 online application for admission or forwarded separately. The statement should not exceed two A4 pages in total and in some cases may only need to be brief. All relevant criteria listed will be taken into account and it is in your interests to address them. Please see page 12 of How to complete your application form on how to complete the supporting statement. **You should note that assessment of your application may be delayed if this statement is not provided with your application.**

In some cases supplementary assessment processes will be used to determine or refine your ranking against some or all of the selection criteria addressed in your supporting statement. Some courses may also involve a follow-up assessment and you will be advised if this is considered necessary. Applicants should check the requirements for each course by viewing the relevant website:

Applicants for the Bachelor of Music (including combined degrees) are required to attend an audition, interview, music theory and aural test.

Applicants for the Bachelor of Music Studies are required to undertake an admission written test and interview.

Applicants for the Bachelor of Fine Arts (including combined degrees) are required to attend an interview and submit a portfolio.

Applicants for the Bachelor of Nursing (2-Year Fast Track) are required to complete a UniSelect test.

## Work qualifications, experience or other background/circumstances

A fully completed supporting statement providing evidence of capacity to succeed (see How to complete your application form for selection criteria) will enable the University to consider your application if you have not completed senior secondary, tertiary or TAFE/VET study, but have other relevant experience and background, e.g.:

- you have completed a professional or work-based qualification relevant to the course you wish to study. Applicants in this group will be assessed on the content of their supporting statement addressing the selection criteria and their professional qualifications. Certified evidence of professional qualifications must be included; or
- you have relevant study, work or other experience that supports a reasonable prospect of completing the course to which you seek admission; or
- you have suffered educational disadvantage owing to illness, lack of TCE subject opportunities or other adverse personal circumstances. Please include details in your supporting statement addressing the selection criteria. You should also provide documentary evidence where appropriate; or
- you have successfully completed relevant VET programs but have fewer than the minimum entry requirements of four Senior Secondary pre-tertiary subjects. Include details in your supporting statement addressing the selection criterion 'Academic Background'.

## Quota selection

Courses at the University may be subject to quota selection in 2010, as some courses have a limited number of places and high numbers of applications.

Selection of applicants with Senior Secondary school qualifications will, for most courses, be based on the Tertiary Entrance Rank (TER) or equivalent interstate TER (ENTER, ATAR, OP). These applicants will be selected in rank order. Where selection is based on other than a TER, such as in Performing Arts courses, all applicants will be ranked in merit order, on the basis of selection criteria determined by the relevant Faculty Admissions Committee.

## Entry pathways

UTAS encourages and supports people's desires and plans to study at University. For applicants who do not meet **General Entry Requirements**, we may be able to offer a pathway to Bachelor level study via the Associate Degree.

The Associate Degree (itself a formal qualification for 2 years of full-time study) is offered in a number of disciplines:

- Aquaculture
- Arts
- Business Management
- Computing
- Furniture Design
- General Studies
- Music Studies
- Science

The Associate Degree, when offered as a pathway to Bachelor level study, is a stepping stone process. It provides an opportunity for students to experience the requirements and demands of tertiary study, acquaint them with university life, and enable them to ease gently into study. Applicants offered a pathway option via an Associate Degree may only need to complete one or two semesters within the Associate Degree structure before being eligible to apply for admission to a Bachelor degree.

Study in the Associate Degree may be full time or part time, and students can choose to study units from Bachelor degree programs, as well as Preparatory and/or Foundation Units.

UTAS is committed to guiding and supporting all its students to enable them to achieve positive academic outcomes. UTAS has staff available who are available to assist all students, especially first year students, in their transition to tertiary study. Our Pathway Officers will liaise with the relevant Student Advisers on behalf of Pathway students so that services, support, information and advice, is available and accessible if needed.

We strongly encourage all applicants to explore the wealth of information, services and opportunities that UTAS has to offer students. Our web pages are a great place to start.

## Credit

Some applicants will be eligible to apply for credit for previous study. An Application for Credit is an application to count a unit or subject already passed at UTAS or another educational institution, towards the course for which you are now applying. Restrictions on credit may apply depending on how long ago the studies were completed.

If all the documents required to assess your eligibility for credit are received on time, you may be advised of the result of your application for credit when offered a place.

Applicants who have participated in one of the UTAS College Programs (e.g. Higher Achiever Program, Prelude, Overture, Languages, Visual and Performing Arts or Philosophy) should talk to their faculty about credit.

Australian Maritime College seafaring applicants who are seeking credit for STCW95 Short Courses should provide certified copies of all STCW95 Short Course Certificates and Certificates of Competency including endorsements

## Course Structures

---

### Standard course structures

UTAS is implementing standard course structures for undergraduate degrees from 2010.

### What does this mean for students?

Students who are beginning a new course in 2010 will be in the new degree structures. In the transition phase, the majority of students who began their course pre-2010 will be able to transfer to the new degrees structures in 2011.

Some of the benefits are:

- greater flexibility within the degree rules, which will allow you to study subjects from different disciplines outside the degree schedule more easily through student electives, allowing you the choice of gaining a greater breadth of knowledge and skills from your degree
- standard structures which will allow you to manage your own enrolment more easily
- easier identification of majors, which, in conjunction with the introduction of a new student information management system through the SLIMS project, will allow majors to be identified on your academic transcript

### New terminology

The terminology will be updated and applied more consistently. To reflect the fact that subjects of all levels may be studied in different years of your degree and that many students study part-time, the terms will be:

#### *Old names*

First year unit

Second year unit

Third/Fourth/Fifth year unit

#### *New names*

Introductory level unit

Intermediate level unit

Advanced level unit

The components in degrees will be more consistently described as:

**Major:** a standard major will be 8 units: 2 introductory, 2 intermediate and 4 advanced level units. In some degrees which require 2 majors there may be either two standard majors or a standard major and a reversed major, which will be 8 units: 4 introductory, 2 intermediate and 2 advanced level units.

**Minor:** 2 introductory and 2 intermediate level units. A minor also usually forms the first half of a standard major.

Degree electives: units chosen from a schedule of available units from within the faculty. In some degrees there may be a limited number of units at one or two levels or mandatory units in the degree electives.

### **Student electives:**

- Student elective units may be chosen from any unit offered by the University that is identified as a Student elective, which you are eligible to enrol in (usually by meeting the pre-requisite requirements), and for which, in the case of units with a quota on enrolments, there is a place available for you.
- When choosing Student elective units, the units must be within the minimum and maximum numbers of units required at each level (i.e. introductory, intermediate or advanced) within the degree.
- Some degree sample plans may provide suggestions on appropriate units to be taken as Student electives; you are not obliged to follow these suggestions.

The information on the Course and Unit Handbook for your degree will advise you of the modules and units available and what you need to study to complete the requirements for your degree.

# Application and acceptance

---

## How to apply Online

- **The preferred method of application is online at <http://www.utas.edu.au/apply> -** (if required, a supporting statement may be completed online or submitted separately).
- By applying through the online application system you will also be able to check whether any supporting documents are required, change your preferences, update your contact details and accept your offer online. A printed copy of your offer will also be posted in the mail.
- Make sure that your application is complete including if relevant, a supporting statement addressing the selection criteria. Check carefully to see if you need to forward any certified transcripts of academic records or other documentation. To ensure your documents are correctly matched to your application, clearly mark your name on each page. Staple documents once only in the top left corner. Academic transcripts and visa/citizenship documentation must be certified by a Commissioner of Declarations, a Justice of the Peace, a university or college Registrar or other recognised examining authority (colour copies are not necessary).
- Submit the application and any necessary supporting documents as soon as possible.
- Do not submit more than one application. If you change your mind about your course preferences, please change your preferences online, or email [Admissions@utas.edu.au](mailto:Admissions@utas.edu.au).
- If you are unable to apply online, you may complete a 2010 Application for Admission form, following the instructions in How to complete your application form. You must contact the Student Centre to obtain a form on 1300 361 928.

## **Closing date**

The closing date for all on-time undergraduate applications is 5.00pm on Wednesday 30 September 2009 and for on-time postgraduate applications is 5.00pm on Friday 30 October 2009. However, we encourage all applicants to submit applications early as assessment begins as soon as your application is received. This will also give you the opportunity to make early preparations for study. Do not wait until examination results are received, study leave is approved or a decision made about scholarships, financial assistance or housing before lodging your application.

### **Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery**

Applications for the Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery (M3N, M3NC) course must be received by 5.00pm on Wednesday 30 September to be considered as on-time. Late applications for this course will not be accepted for assessment. However, if applicants have indicated Medicine as one of their initial preferences in an on-time application, they can change the order of their preferences after this date (e.g. Medicine preference 3 to Medicine preference 1).

## **Late applications**

The University will accept and consider late applications for courses other than Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery, where places for the courses listed are still available.

## **Acknowledgement of application**

Online applications will be acknowledged within 7 days and you will be emailed a receipt upon submission. If we require further documentation from you we will contact you outlining the requirements.

## **Change of course preference**

If you applied by web you can return to your application and choose Change of Preference from the Menu. (Go to [www.utas.edu.au/apply](http://www.utas.edu.au/apply) and then take the link to Change of Preference)

## **Change of address**

If you applied by web you can return to your application and choose Change of Address from the Menu. (Go to [www.utas.edu.au/apply](http://www.utas.edu.au/apply), and then take the link to Change of Address.)

## **Interviews and auditions**

The University reserves the right to interview or audition any applicant prior to selection or to conduct other special selection processes in some cases.

## **Offers**

Early offers for non-quota restricted courses will be available from 28 August 2009.

Offers for quota-restricted courses will be available progressively from mid October 2009.

First round offers for 2009 Year 12 Tasmanian applicants will be available on the 15 December 2009.

First round offers for 2009 Year 12 Interstate applicants will be available progressively following release of Year 12 results.

If you have been successful, you will receive an offer for the course highest on your list of preferences for which you have met the selection requirements and for which a place is available.

## **Unsuccessful applications**

In cases where applicants do not receive an offer in the course(s) of their choice, the University will contact you to discuss other course options.

If you have been unsuccessful in gaining a place in any course you will be contacted by the University. An offer into a quota-restricted course may, however, still be possible if late places become available. In other words, it may still be possible for you to receive an offer after having previously been advised otherwise.

## **Acceptance of offers**

You must receive an offer of a place before you can accept and subsequently enrol. If your application is successful you will be sent a letter of offer along with an acceptance form. Online applicants can do this through the eApplications website.

Applicants wishing to accept an offer of a place in a quota-restricted course must do so by the date specified in their letter of offer, otherwise the offer will automatically lapse and places re-offered to other applicants.

All applicants are encouraged to accept their offer as early as possible.

## Ready for Uni workshops

These workshops are designed to assist you with understanding your offer, the steps you need to follow in managing your enrolment and preparation for commencement of study.

When you accept your offer, you will have the opportunity to book your place at a Ready for Uni Workshop at the Hobart, Launceston or Cradle Coast Campus.

## Deferral

If you have received an offer of a place and wish to delay commencing your undergraduate course until 2011, you may be eligible to apply for a deferral.

Deferrals will only be granted to students who meet one of the following criteria:

- a Tertiary Entrance Rank (TER) of at least 75; or
- a completed International Baccalaureate Diploma with a score of at least 26; or
- a University Grade Point Average (GPA) of at least 5.

Deferrals are not available in all courses and are strictly limited in some others. The Faculty of Health Science and the Conservatorium of Music have restrictions on the availability and/or number of deferrals. Students who have received an offer of a place in a course within either of these areas, should review the information on the following websites:

An approved deferral means that you are guaranteed a place in the course in the following year and you do not need to reapply for entry, we will contact you prior to your commencement.

If you are not eligible for a deferral, there are still many options open to you, including:

- you may be able to enrol part-time;
- you may be able to commence in second semester;
- discuss your study options with Faculty or transition staff.

# Course Information

---

## The Advanced Honours Program – Faculty of Arts

The Advanced Honours Program in the Faculty of Arts aims to provide high achieving undergraduate students with a learning environment in which their academic potential and creative excellence is encouraged and nurtured throughout the course of their undergraduate study.

The program runs concurrently alongside a number of degree courses in the Faculty of Arts and comprises seminars, presentations by visiting scholars and artists, forums and workshops during the academic year. Students will also have access to their own academic mentor who will provide individual academic mentoring and advice. To remain in the program students must maintain a distinction average in their study. Upon successful completion of their undergraduate degree students will gain direct entry into an Honours degree in the Faculty of Arts.

Year 12 students who expect to gain a TER/ITI score of 90 or above can apply for admission to the Advanced Honours Program within a single or combined degree course in the Faculty of Arts. The Advanced Honours program is available in the BA, BFA, BMUS and degrees combined with these courses. To apply for entry to an Advanced Honours Program select the relevant admission code, eg. 13AA *Bachelor of Arts (Advanced Honours)*. ## Bachelor of Fine Arts (BFA) and Bachelor of Visual Communication (BVC) applicants

Applicants are normally expected to have satisfied the University's admission requirements. It is a distinct advantage for applicants to have completed a practically orientated pre-tertiary Visual Arts or Design subject or TAFE certificate, or have equivalent experience and/or qualifications.

Applicants who do not meet these requirements should submit a folio consisting of no more than ten photographs, drawings, paintings or electronic images of work and a statement outlining their interest in the course including any relevant experience or qualifications. Unsuccessful applicants to Bachelor degree courses may instead be offered admission to the Associate Degree in Arts, and after successful completion of 1 or 2 semesters can transfer to the BFA/BVC.

Where applicants have little or no evidence of a previous interest in or study of visual art or design they will be required to undertake FSA001 Preparatory Studies in Fine Art and Design in their first semester. Course counselling will be offered to all successful applicants prior to

the start of semester, to discuss choice of studio and potential careers.

## **Bachelor of Nursing 2 Year Fast Track**

Year 12 applicants will be assessed on their Year 12 results. Tertiary applicants will be assessed on their Tertiary results and other relevant experience and qualifications. All other applicants will be required to complete a UniSelect test to complete their application. There is no charge for this test. The test will be offered on both the Sandy Bay campus in Tasmania, and the Rozelle campus in New South Wales (applies to both St. Vincent's & Mater Health and Rozelle applicants). Online applicants will be booked into a test within the application system. Paper applicants will be contacted by the School of Nursing and Midwifery for a booking. ## **Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery applicants**

Applications for Medicine close at **5pm on Wednesday, 30 September 2009**. Late applications for the Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery (M3N, M3NC) will **not** be considered.

All applicants must complete the course prerequisites, TCE pre-tertiary (or equivalent) Chemistry and English, with a successful result prior to 1 February 2010. Provision of evidence of the successful completion is required by 8 February 2010.

***Medical Rural Bonded Scholarship (MRB)*** - To apply for a Medical Rural Bonded Scholarship at this University, download the MRB expression of interest form from the Tasmanian School of Medicine website. Forms are available after 1 August at <http://www.medicine.utas.edu.au/admissions/mrbs08.html>. Send this completed form to the School of Medicine. The Admissions Office does not manage this process.

***Bonded Medical Places (BMP) Scheme - (M3NC)*** - Applicants selecting this preference need to be aware that there is no financial scholarship attached to these places and should look at the information provided by the Australian Government at this website: <http://www.health.gov.au/internet/wcms/publishing.nsf/content/health-workforce-bmp>. (Applicants who express interest in a BMP do not forfeit their eligibility to be offered a non-bonded place).

## **Alternative pathways into Medicine and Pharmacy**

### **Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery**

For 2010, UTAS accepts into Medicine up to 10 Australian applicants (including up to 6 from the Bachelor of Medical Research) each year on the basis of performance in one of the

following Pathway courses, the Bachelor of Medical Research, Bachelor of Biomedical Science, Bachelor of Health Science, Bachelor of Biotechnology, Bachelor of Science or the Bachelor of Environmental Science at UTAS. To be eligible to apply for the available places, applicants must have:

- completed a full-time year of study at UTAS in one of the listed degrees in the year prior to the proposed Medicine enrolment; and
- achieved a Distinction average (70%) or above for the two most recent semesters of full-time study; and
- satisfied the year 12 pre-requisites for Medicine - TCE pre-tertiary Chemistry (CHM315109) and Year 12 English (ENC315109 or ENW315109 or ENS315109) or equivalent; and
- completed the UMAT and have achieved a combined UMAT score at least equal to the lowest UMAT score in the cohort selected in other pathways.

Please note that from 2011 the approved Pathway courses will include the Bachelor of Pharmacy.

## **Bachelor of Pharmacy**

UTAS will accept into the Bachelor of Pharmacy up to 5 Australian applicants each year on the basis of performance in the Bachelor of Medical Research, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Biotechnology, Bachelor of Biomedical Science, Bachelor of Health Science or the Bachelor of Environmental Science at UTAS. To be eligible to apply for the available places, applicants must have:

- completed a full-time year of study at UTAS in one of the listed degrees in the year prior to the proposed Pharmacy enrolment; and
- achieved a Grade Point Average of at least 6 (a distinction average)
- satisfied the year 12 pre-requisites for Pharmacy - TCE pre-tertiary Chemistry (CHM315109) and Mathematics Methods (MTM315109) or equivalent.

Students who complete appropriate units in the course prior to applying for Pharmacy may be granted credit for those units in the Bachelor of Pharmacy. It should be noted that, at this stage, this will not reduce the number of years of study in the Bachelor of Pharmacy, but students granted credit may have reduced workloads in some years of the program. Interested students should seek advice from the School of Pharmacy about units that may attract credit prior to undertaking the alternative entry program.

## Australian Maritime College (AMC)

AMC is a specialist institute of the University and it offers both Vocational (VET) courses and Higher Education (HE) courses.

## Law and Combined Law degree entry requirements

### Year 12 (direct entry) applicants

For 2010 entry the Faculty of Law will have a limited number of direct entry places available into the combined Bachelor of Laws degrees. To be eligible for entry applicants will need a minimum TER score of 90.

If you wish to apply for one of these places, and you are a Year 12 applicant, please put the relevant degree with Introduction to Law as your first preference. For example, if you wish to be considered for the Bachelor of Economics and Bachelor of Laws (combined) indicate this by applying for Bachelor of Economics (+ Introduction to Law and Legal Systems). If you then achieve the required entry score, and there are enough places available, you will automatically be placed into the Bachelor of Economics and Bachelor of Laws (combined). Students are still required to complete the first year in another faculty (75%) in addition to the units LAW121 Introduction to Law and LAW122 Legal Systems.

### **Non year 12 applicants**

If you do not have a TER of 90 or are applying as a non-Year 12, you may still apply for entry. You should apply for a relevant degree with the units LAW121 Introduction to Law and LAW122 Legal Systems in 2010 and be assessed at the end of the first year of study for transfer to a combined or straight Law degree.

### **University/Graduate applicants**

If you have already completed an undergraduate Bachelor's degree, or have successfully completed one year in another faculty including the subjects LAW121 Introduction to Law and LAW122 Legal Systems, you are eligible to apply for any of the Faculty of Law courses. Entry into these courses is based on academic performance in prior university studies.

## **Enabling and Supporting Programs 2010**

### **Programs to prepare you for tertiary study**

The University of Tasmania (UTAS) recognises that starting or resuming study can be a daunting experience. ### **Faculty of Law International Student Support Program (ISSP)**

# What will it cost me to study at University?

## 1. Fees and charges

Information is available from [www.goingtouni.gov.au](http://www.goingtouni.gov.au)

### Types of Places

Universities and institutions offering higher education courses may offer domestic students either a Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP) or a Postgraduate Fee-paying place. CSPs may only be offered to:

- Australian citizens
- New Zealand citizens (resident in Australia during their studies)
- Australian permanent residency visa (resident in Australia during their studies)
- Australian permanent humanitarian visa (resident in Australia during their studies)

Students born outside Australia will be required to provide evidence of their citizenship or residency status at the time of application for admission.

### Commonwealth Supported Places (CSP)

While the Australian Government contributes substantially towards course costs for CSPs, students are also required to pay a student contribution. Each institution sets its own student contribution for each unit of study, and student contributions will vary between institutions and courses. These student contributions must be within a pre-determined range, set by the Australian Government. The student contribution for each unit of study is published on the Course and Unit website at <http://www.utas.edu.au/units>.

### Student Learning Entitlements (SLE)

From the commencement of 2005, each domestic student receives a Student Learning Entitlement (SLE) of 7 years equivalent full-time study in a CSP as a Commonwealth supported student.

- Students who study part-time will not be disadvantaged;
- SLE is only consumed upon commencement of units of study in a CSP; and
- Additional SLE will be allocated to students enrolled in certain courses i.e. honours, undergraduate degrees longer than six years etc.

Students are responsible for monitoring their SLE remaining balance and consequent eligibility for courses using the Higher Education Information Management System outlined below. If you have already consumed some of your SLE and will not have enough to complete your course as a CSP student you may be required to transfer to a full fee paying place.

## **Fee-Paying Places (Postgraduate only)**

Each institution sets its own tuition fee for each course and unit. The tuition fee you pay for your course is the sum of the tuition fees for each enrolled unit. The cost of each unit is published on the Course and Unit website at <http://www.utas.edu.au/units>. Tuition fees will not be less than the student contributions paid by Commonwealth supported students.

## **Commonwealth Higher Education Student Support Number (CHESSN)**

When a person applies for admission to a higher education provider, personal details will be provided electronically to the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations (DEEWR). Applicants must give informed consent to their data being provided to, and stored by, the Commonwealth at the time of application by completing the declaration on the application form. DEEWR will allocate a CHESSN or return an existing CHESSN and the usage (or balance) of the person's ordinary SLE to the University. DEEWR is responsible for allocating CHESSNs. This means that every student receiving Commonwealth higher education assistance through a CSP will be allocated a CHESSN. This number will stay with the student throughout their academic life, allowing confirmation of eligibility for Commonwealth support.

## **Higher Education Information Management System (HEIMS)**

The Australian Government has established a web-based information management system, HEIMS, to assist in the management of student and higher education providers.

Students can access through HEIMS a student private portal for a summary of their personal details regarding Commonwealth assistance provided to you through <http://www.goingtouni.gov.au>. Using your CHESSN and other personal identifying data, students have access to their liability under HELP debts (deferred student contribution or tuition fee loan) and their use of SLE and Commonwealth Learning Scholarships.

## **Payment Options**

### **Commonwealth Supported Places (CSP)**

Australian citizens or holders of an Australian permanent humanitarian visa resident in Australia during the course of their study in a CSP may:

- pay up front; or
- receive HECS-HELP by deferring payment of the full student contribution; or
- pay some of the student contribution up front and receive HECS-HELP for the remainder.

If a student pays their whole student contribution or at least \$500 they will receive a 20% discount on the amount paid up front. Outstanding HECS-HELP debts are recorded with the Australian Taxation Office. There are no fees charged on administering HECS-HELP debts.

Australian permanent residency visa holders and New Zealand citizens must pay student contributions up-front and will not be eligible to receive a discount.

## **2. Textbooks and other requirements**

Books and stationery can prove expensive, especially during the early part of the year. Essential textbooks are listed in the unit information provided at <http://www.utas.edu.au/courses> and you will be advised which ones to buy early in the course. You should budget for this expense and should typically allow for an expenditure of \$600-\$900 per year. You may also be required to pay specific course/unit related charges to cover costs of excursions and field-trips, laboratory costs, lecture notes etc. Note: Fine Art students are required to meet the cost of materials which will be at least \$1000 per year. Nursing students are required to meet costs associated with uniforms, travel and accommodation for nursing practice in second and third year.

## **3. Need Financial Help to Study? Reading this could be very important!**

### **Tasmania Scholarships and Bursaries**

The Tasmania Scholarships program at the University of Tasmania is a multi-million dollar program which provides generous financial support for a large range of students, particularly those commencing an undergraduate course who need financial assistance to study. The program includes not just academic scholarships but numerous sponsored scholarships and around 200 access scholarships each year.

Full details of these scholarships, including information on the Commonwealth Indigenous Access Scholarships (see below), are available on the Tasmania Scholarships website <http://www.scholarships.utas.edu.au>. It is recommended that every applicant for a place at UTAS considers whether they could be eligible for a scholarship or bursary.

Online applications for the Tasmania Scholarships program open on 3 August and close on 31 October 2009 and are available on the Tasmania Scholarships website <http://www.scholarships.utas.edu.au>. Generally one application covers all awards available

under the program. An early application – preferably during September – will assist us to make offers as soon as practicable. Offers will be made progressively from early December 2009.
